

Creating a shared approach to reducing teenage pregnancy in England, using Croydon as an example.

Previous Teenage Pregnancy Strategy



• England still has one of highest rates in western Europe

- Progress varies considerable between local authorities
 - 30% 70% reduction
 - 1/3 having significantly higher teenage pregnancy rates than England average



Narrow the gap in progress

Previous Teenage Pregnancy Strategy

Impact of this variation and loss of coordination is felt at multiple levels



- 75% of all teenage pregnancies unplanned
- Over 19,000 young women became pregnant in 2015 over 50% of those pregnancies ending in a termination.
- Best Practice: access to contraception, youth friendly environment and high quality sex and relationship education.

Mother:

- 3 times higher rate of post natal depression and higher risk of poor mental health for
 3 years after giving birth
- 20% more likely to have no qualifications by age 30

Child:

- 63% increased risk of experiencing child poverty
- Babies born to teenage mothers have a 60% higher risk of infant mortality.



The cost of these negative outcomes borne by NHS and local authority

Outcomes to be gained

- Every £1 spent on teenage pregnancy prevention strategy resulted in £4 saved.
- Better coordination now will result in savings now and in the future
- Local authorities to have right mix of services
- Test a series of innovations and improvements to strengthen outcomes
- Better decision making
- Better outcomes for teenagers and for children of teenage parents
- Better impact on reducing rate
