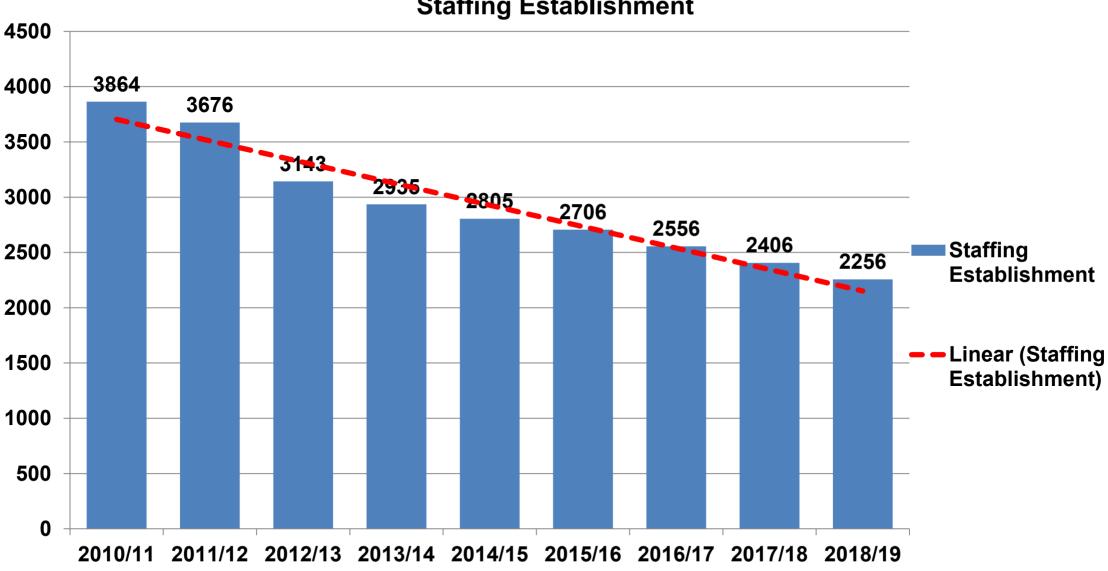

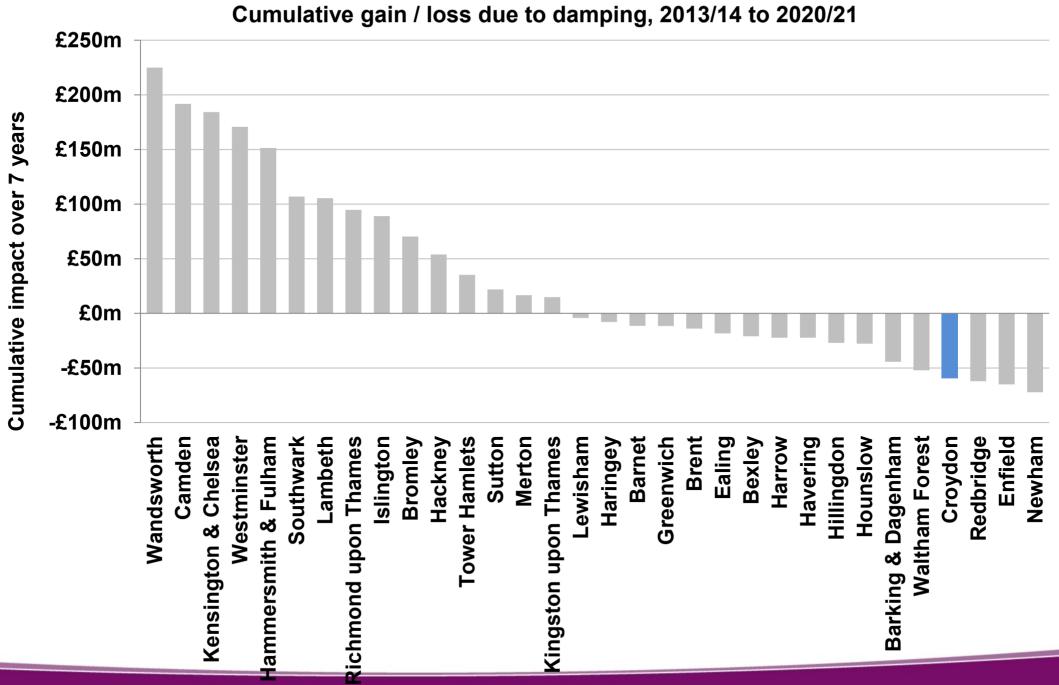

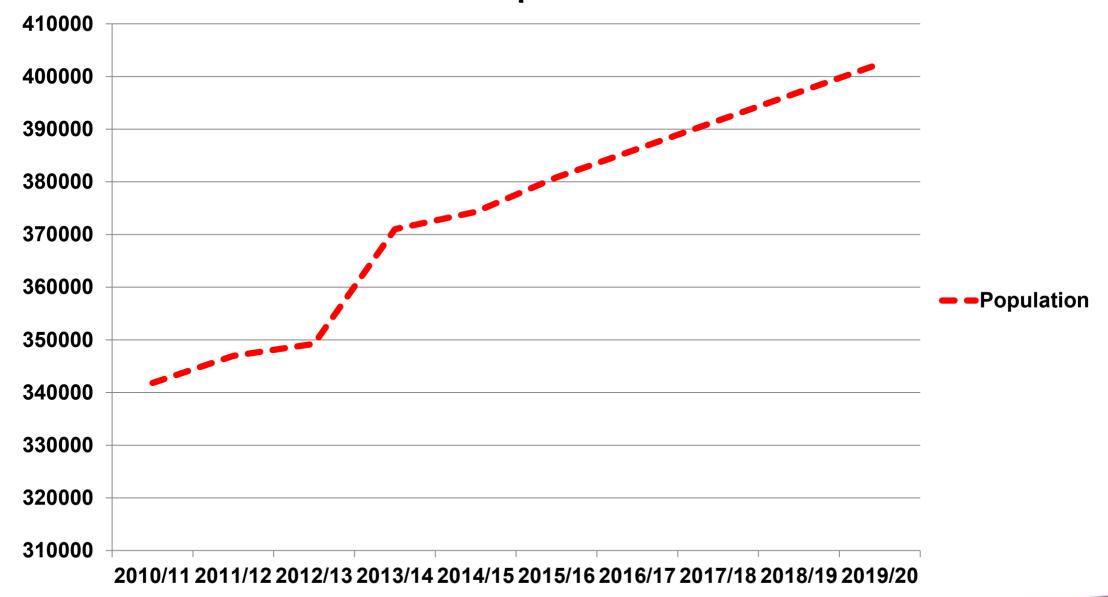
#### **Staffing Establishment**

### **CSR Summary for Local Government**

#### Funding announcements:

- A reduction of £6.1bn or 53% in cash funding between 2015/16 (£11.5bn) and 2019/20 (£5.4bn)
- Additional funding for Social Care
  - A 2% council tax 'precept'
  - £1.5bn added to BCF by 2019/20
- Reform to New Homes Bonus
  - Potential move to 4 years and changes to percentage shares
- Public Health Grant reduced by 3.9% p/a real terms
- £600m reduction in Education Services Grant
- Proceeds from asset sales to fund revenue costs of reform

- We are "in the middle of a revolution in funding for local government" (IFS)

### Strong foundations to build on...

- **75%** satisfaction with Croydon as a place to live
- **72%** identify strongly with Croydon as a place
- 72% thought their area would either stay the same or improve in next five years
- 64% of residents are proud of Croydon
- 64% of residents thought their area had either stayed the same or improved in the last five years
- 60% of residents are satisfied with the council
- 60% of residents think the council keeps them informed about what it does



### With some things to improve...

- 56% of residents said they were keen to get more involved in their local community (although 45% said they don't have time)
- 54% of residents trusts the council to take decisions in their interests

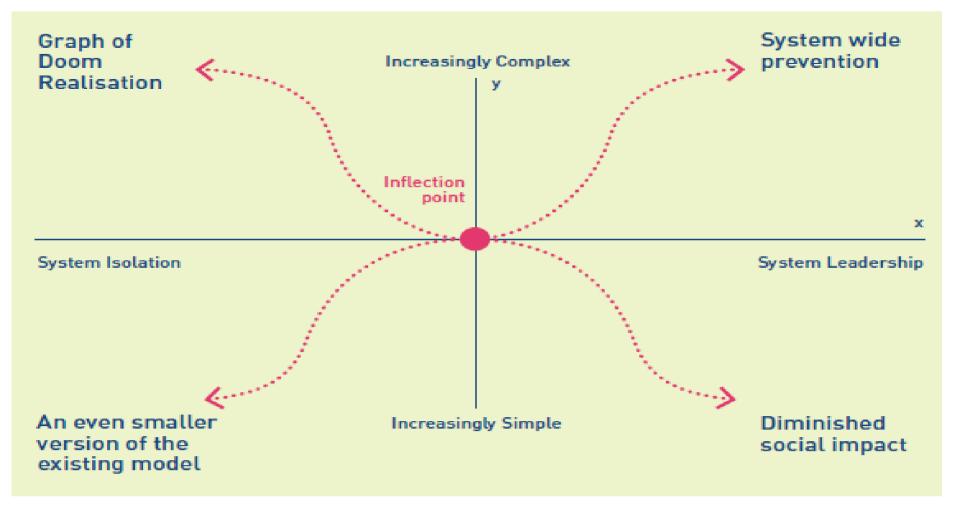


# And things we must work even harder on...
