

- Executive Group providing leadership weekly meetings during Covid 19 lockdown



- New Safeguarding Partnership launched and steered through the three safeguarding partners Executive Group.
- Three 'issues based' partnership meetings
- Ofsted Inspection of Local Authority Children's Services- GOOD
- Covid19- Multi-agency safeguarding activity steered via the Executive Group.
- Commitment through the Partnership to addressing Black Lives
 Matter issues of inequality and discrimination.
- Significant achievement of change through the priority groups.

Priority Groups:

Neglect:

 Widespread understanding of the NSPCC Graded Care Profile2 in identifying and supporting families.

Children with Disabilities:

 Implementation of the SEND Strategy improving the understanding and approach to safeguarding for this highly vulnerable group of children.

Vulnerable Adolescent Group:

- Joined up approach with community organisations, schools, health and Police to understand and reduce vulnerabilities in adolescence.
- Trauma informed approach
