Summer is upon us, and so many residents will be more frequently using our beautiful parks and green spaces. This will inevitably lead to a greater amount of waste being produced and park bins being filled to overflowing many times a day.

Can the Cabinet Member please detail:

- the process by which the frequency for emptying the park bins is established during the different demands of each month;
- how the frequency changes from month to month based on demand (i.e. How many times each day are bins emptied in the winter vs summer?)
- what the penalties are for contracted waste cleaning services who do not empty according to the criteria outline by the Council.
- where possible list the bin emptying rota for each of Croydon's parks during the summer season.

Reply

Under the conservative administration the budget for parks was cut to the tune of £500,000 just prior to the award of the current contract.

Bins in our parks are emptied on a performance basis rather than to a specific frequency. The contract specifies that litter bins should not be more than 75% full at any time. The contractor is therefore required to deploy sufficient resources to maintain this standard. The resource required to achieve this fluctuates over the year to cater for seasonal variation and holiday periods based on demand.

Any bins found to fall outside of this specification are required to be rectified within 2 hours. Failure to do so results in a default being issued to the contractor, and if a certain number of defaults are accumulated in a period, a financial penalty is applied.

Since 2015 over 150 dual use bins have been introduced in to our parks, these have greater capacity and can take a mix of litter and dog fouling bringing the total number of bins deployed to over 490.

Fly-tipping and domestic refuse sacks are often encountered in our parks which leads to bins being immediately full or loose bags being attacked by foxes and dogs causing increased litter problems and requiring the contractor to clear and litter pick before moving on to the next park and reducing their ability to respond more rapidly.

The council is ambitious for how our Parks are used and we wish to see a high standard of care and maintenance at each green space. I am pleased that we have been able to respond

to residents requests and removed recycling facilities at Ashburton Park which had become an unsightly mess of dumping.

Our contract monitoring team have been doing a great job in ensuring the high standards that the authority requires of iDverde are carried out, across all of their duties from grass cutting to hedge trimming. Bin Emptying is no exception.

Croydon Talks Parks Survey

I have looked through the results from this survey and I would like a bit more information on the data.

On page 10 'Getting more involved' it states that 463 people responded to the question (in the online survey) about whether they would be interested in getting more involved. Please give me a breakdown of the responses to this question in terms of numbers and percentages.

Please give a breakdown of the types and numbers of responses from people who said they would like to get more involved and how.

Reply

Shaping and improving parks: online survey

Online survey respondents were asked whether they thought 'growing food; planting trees; clearing litter; raising funds for new playgrounds; and joining 'Friends of' groups' were good ways of getting involved in shaping and improving parks and whether they had any ideas of their own. They were also asked if they would be interested in getting more involved. 463 people responded to this question.

Many thought that these were good suggestions. Some other ways of getting involved that were mentioned included promoting activities through social media networks and getting involved in activities that also involved their children.

Of those who explicitly indicated whether they would be interested in getting more involved, there was a mixed response. A small number said they would and a similar number said they would not at this time or because they were already involved in 'Friends of' groups or with litter-picking.

Organising events and activities: online survey

310 people responded to this question. Some who responded said they were already involved either through being a member of a Friends of group or by volunteering at ad hoc events.

Of those who said they would like to get more involved there were three distinct areas that offers of help included:

- Helping with sports activities and events
- Helping with more cultural events
- Promoting activities

Please give a breakdown of the types and numbers of responses from people who said they would like to get more involved and how.

Individual responses to this question were coded into categories (listed below) by The Campaign Company. This means that a particular response that expressed more than one

How much s106/CIL money will be available for Park Hill Park once the masterplanning process has been completed i.e. by January 2018?

Reply

Previously £99,950 was allocated to Park Hill through section 106 funds and it is intended that this funding is rolled forward. There are opportunities for the friends of group to complement this funding through applying for grants, support from other organisation and companies as well as crowd funding. Other friends of groups/community organisations have been successful at using the section 16 funding as a lever to significantly increase funds available. Council officers would provide support to friends of groups who would like to explore these opportunities.

Reply

We will work with friends of groups to explore different sources of funding that are available, which could include funding through community grants, support from private organisation, crowd funding as well as Councillor ward budgets, section 106 and CIL. A number of our friends of groups have been successful in using council funding through for example Section 106 and Councillor ward budgets, as a lever to attract other sources of funding. We will actively encourage and support this approach, as it will deliver the best outcome for all of our parks.

Has a decision been made about whether the seats in the Concert Hall in Fairfield Halls will need to be refurbished or replaced? Is there money in the original Fairfield Halls refurbishment budget for the replacement or refurbishing of the seats? If not, where will the money come from is refurbishment or replacement is necessary?

Reply

A condition survey has been conducted to establish the extent of refurbishment works for each seat, including replacement, in the concert hall and Ashcroft Theatre. The cost of refurbishing the seats has been captured in the overall budget for the Halls.

It is planned that Fairfield Halls will be marketed as a conference venue in future. What plans are there for installing wifi throughout, as well as charging points for mobile devices?

Reply

The marketing plans are for the operator to confirm, the preferred operator has considerable experience in this area and conferencing will be a key part of the viability and success of the venue. Twin data outlets have been allowed for throughout the Halls which have been specifically allocated for wifi. The operator will need to install their own wifi products into this infrastructure to provide a network across the building. Similarly, the operator can choose to specifically provide for phone charging using the provided electrical sockets and wider network.

Please state which parks/friends groups have been successful in applications/requests for funding. Please state, for the two parks that have raised the most money, how much money has been generated in the last three years. For these two parks state how much they have received from each source in the last three years. This information will help other parks to plan how they should go about raising funds.

Reply

Friends of groups have access to various grant funds, depending on their project; each group has very different needs and aspirations, as well as skills. Funding streams can include:

- Landfill funding, like Biffa or Veolia –to fund playgrounds or footpath improvements
- Awards for All/Lottery Funding for signage, seating, volunteer training, events, heritage,
- Cllr Ward Budgets
- Croydon Community Fund
- Spacehive
- Tesco Bags of Help
- Marathon Trust

The two Friends groups who have secured significant external funding with the support of the Parks Development team are:

Can Cllr Godfrey please clarify the arrangements for the on-going maintenance of the concert hall organ. Additionally can he let us know what is happening to the Ashcroft Theatre Safety which was painted by Henry Bird and contains much of the history of Croydon's theatres and the town.

Reply

The Organ is currently stored as at the Harrison and Harrison Ltd workshop in Durham. The protection works carried out are as listed below.

- Removal of the Organ console from the building and placed in storage at Harrison and Harrison Ltd workshop.
- Removal of horizontal pipes and placed in storage at Harrison and Harrison workshop Ltd workshop. Protection of the organ mechanism on site.
- Wrapping of 4No Organ cases in polythene and seal with tape.
- Boarding up of two organ cases that have exposed organ pipes.
- Protection of the Organ blowers and wind duct route to the blowers.

Harrison and Harrison Ltd have an associated history with the Organ as they originally built the Organ and have been maintaining it since its construction.

Regarding the Fire Curtain, due to the Asbestos content of the Fire curtain it was necessary to remove the curtain, knowing the historic value of the curtain, a Photographic scan of the curtain was undertaken to capture the image for historical records and for any future use of the image. The curtain will also feature in the Fairfield Collection Archive project.

Can Cllr. Flemming give an update on the 'Legacy' Croydon Youth Zone in Whitehorse Road:-

- a) How much money has the Onside Charity raised towards the capital costs of building the Zone, please provide a breakdown of where the money has come from?
- b) What is the anticipated opening date of the zone?
- c) Please give a breakdown of the revenue support the Council has provided to the project to date?

Reply

- a) Current Capital Pledges are:
London Borough of Croydon - £3.25m
The Queen's Trust - £1m
The Stone Family Foundation - £0.5m
Anonymous Donor - £1m
Fidelity Foundation - £0.25m

All of the capital required, £6 million in total, is now secured.

One donor has asked that their contribution remain anonymous.

- b) Subject to planning, procurement, completion of the Youth Zone is anticipated in September/October 2018
- d) The Council has not provided any revenue support to the project to date. Post completion the Council has committed to provide £300k per annum, of the £1 million per annum running costs, in each of the first three years of the Youth Zone's operation. Beyond the council commitment OnSide has so far secured a further £350k per annum of private sector, again for a 3 year period.

Riddlesdown Residents' Association have been asking for over six months that the council put down an anti-skid surface before, on and after the junction of Rectory Park and Mitchell Avenue where there have been repeated accidents caused by drivers losing control around the corner. The lamppost recently installed by Skanska has now been seriously damaged three times, most recently on 30/04/2017. Thankfully there have been no fatalities in the recent spate of accidents, but surely the evidence here is quite clear? Only an anti-skid surface on the lower part of Rectory Avenue and around the bend is going to prevent more serious accidents. As yet residents have not had any kind of positive assurance. Will you intervene to ensure this vital safety measure is commissioned?

Reply

I have asked our engineers to consider the introduction of anti-skid surfacing on this bend and include this in their current programme of works. I have also asked that officers look at what other measures could be introduced to help address this problem in addition to the following measures which we have already introduced at this location:

- Central hatched hazard lines
- Two central traffic islands with double sided reflectorized keep left signs
- Extra-large size chevron board sign
- Edge of carriageway hazard marker posts
- A 30mph maximum speed limit sign
- A reduce speed now sign
- A steep hill warning sign
- A number of 'SLOW' carriageway markings in both the uphill and downhill directions
- 'Dragon's teeth' hazard warning markings on the approaches in both directions

169 businesses currently hold a street trading licence

- How many businesses in the borough have actually paid the street-trading tax since implementation?

110 business have so far paid for their street trading licences. There are renewals due for May and others become due thereafter.

- How much revenue has the Council amassed since the street-trading tax was implemented?

From 1 May 2016, when the new fee structure went live to 24 May 2017, application income has been £79,928.

- How many businesses have reached the annual cap on the fee?

3 FTE staff have this in their job requirement. In addition NSO staff are tasked with checking for street trading compliance. Other staff are involved in the administration/enforcement of the street trading licensing process as part of their duties.

- How many businesses that should pay the Council's additional tax have had enforcement action as a result of non-compliance? -

Eight

- With reports of businesses closing citing the negative impact of the sunshine tax (for example 117-year-old hardware store Emerton's in South Norwood), does the Cabinet Member feel the tax is working and will it be continuing or altering the scheme over the next fiscal year?

The intention is for the current fee structure to continue. The Council has a duty to try and ensure that the costs associated with providing a street trading licence service are met by the income from the fees attached to applications for that service. The previous fee structure did not come close to providing the necessary income needed to provide a street trading service so the council were heavily subsidising this through other funding streams, which it could no longer afford to do. The previous fee structure was also unfair as there was a single fee, regardless of the size of the area so the current fee structure has rectified this by requiring people to pay by the square metre of the highway that they use.

New street trading designation applications continue to be made and considered by the Council's licensing committee. In addition, at the last committee, there were applications to increase the trading area on one licence and increase the trading hours on another licence.

- How many businesses in Croydon have cited excessive locally determined taxation as their reason for closure?

We are not aware of any businesses that have closed down as a result of the increase in fees. However, 13 businesses have so far surrendered their street trading licences citing the increase in fees as the reason for withdrawing.

Reply

Our Ambitious for Croydon manifesto made it clear that we would put openness and transparency back at the heart of decision making. In 2014 we reintroduced webcasting to all meetings of the Cabinet, Council and the Scrutiny Committee. In 2015, we extended webcasting to all Scrutiny Sub-Committees and we have also recently taken the decision to begin webcasting meetings of the Planning Committee.

As with all public services, we must balance the cost against both the benefit and the opportunity cost of using the resources to provide other vital public services. The balance we have achieved in webcasting those meetings that residents have the most interest in, whilst ensuring strong value for money, sits alongside many other measures that we have taken to open up democracy in the Town Hall. These include expanding the number and remit of scrutiny committees, allowing opposition Councillors to participate more fully in Cabinet meetings, opening up the council meeting to allow residents more time for questions and making it dramatically easier to debate residents' petitions.

This stands in sharp contrast to the previous Conservative administration's track record, which was not only to stop all webcasting services, but also to ban recording of any Council and Committee meetings by residents – another issue that was remedied by this Labour administration.
