To apply the sale of alcohol and to add conditions to the licence.

1. Any queue to enter the premise that forms outside the premises shall be kept orderly and supervised by SIA door supervisors to ensure that there is no nuisance or obstruction to the public highway and footpaths.
2. Any person who appears to be intoxicated or who is behaving in a disorderly manner shall not be allowed entry to the premises.
3. All staff engaged outside the entrance to the premises, or supervising or controlling queues, shall wear high-visibility jackets or vests.
4. Operate an anti-drugs policy in conjunction with a search and seizure policy. This will also include storage and disposal procedures. Signage will be displayed throughout the premises.
5. Operate a weapons policy in conjunction with search and seizure. This will also include storage and disposal procedures.
6. Operate an anti theft policy, which will include the reporting of theft, safe storage of found items, storage and disposal procedures for all items of property found or discarded at the premises. Signage will be on display in prominent places advising customers to safeguard their property.
7. A clear visible notice shall be placed at the entrance to the premises advising those attending that it is a condition of entry that customers agree to being searched and that police will be informed if anyone is found in possession of controlled substance or weapons.
8. An incident log (which may be electronically recorded) shall be kept at the premises for at least six months, and made available on request

to police or an authorised officer. The following details shall be recorded: -

- a. Date
  - b. Time
  - c. Location
  - d. Persons concerned
  - e. Summary of incident
  - f. Identification of any Emergency Services Personnel who attended
9. There shall be a documented dispersal policy, as agreed with the relevant responsible authorities, implemented at the premises and a copy lodged with the Police Licensing Team.
10. The Challenge 25 scheme must be operated to ensure that any person who appears to be under the age of 25 shall provide documented proof that they are over 18 years of age. Proof of age shall only comprise a valid and in date passport, photo card driving licence, military card or a card bearing the PASS hologram.
11. Ensure that polycarbonate drinking vessels are used for all alcoholic and soft drinks served to customers and that all drinks supplied in glass bottles will be decanted into polycarbonate serving or drinking vessels.
12. Ensure that non-alcoholic drinks are available for retail sales at all times when the sale of alcohol is authorised at the site by the Premises Licence
13. Comply with the reasonable requests of the Metropolitan Police in respect of the prevention of crime and disorder.
14. Ensure that customers prevented from leaving the event site with bottles or open containers.
15. When ACS approved SIA door staff are deployed ensure that records are kept by the DPS, at the premises, of the following details of any door-supervisor employed at the premises: -
- Name and date of birth
  - Full 16 digit SIA badge number
  - Dates and times employed

These records shall be made available, in useable form, to the Metropolitan Police, Croydon Council officers or authorised officers of the Security Industry Authority upon request.

16. A direct telephone number (mobile to be held by duty manager) will be provided to neighbouring premises to be used in the event of a complaint of noise nuisance.
17. So far as reasonably practicable the premises licence holder shall ensure the event is run in accordance with an event management plan. Any such event management plan shall have been reviewed by the SAG as chaired by Croydon Council. Any event management plan should have been submitted a minimum of 60 days before the event date for review by the SAG.
18. The event management plans for each event shall include the following information as a minimum; site plans, stewarding/security plans, crowd management plans, medical plan, fire plan, specific safety policies and risk assessments.
19. The premises licence holder shall nominate one person for every event to act as safety co-ordinator who is authorised by the premises licence holder to act on their behalf to carry out reasonable requests made by the SAG at Croydon or to carry out reasonable requests made by authorities during visits. The details of this person must be provided in advance a minimum of 30 days before the event date.
20. Pre-event planning meetings shall be arranged in conjunction with the Council, the Metropolitan Police, London Ambulance Service and London Fire Brigade for each large event. These meetings shall be additional to the SAG.
21. The communication system in place for the event space shall ensure the effective operation of the site under both normal and emergency conditions.
22. Notify the Metropolitan Police and the London Borough of Croydon with a minimum 45 days notice of any proposed large event and any change to the calendar of events.
23. An Event Specific Risk Assessment shall be completed for all events. Any risk identified as medium or above shall be communicated to Croydon Council Events Officer. Where the risk may have an effect of public disorder the Croydon Police Licensing Team must also be notified and the security strategy will be adapted to suit, in consultation with the Police. Further, a minimum ratio of 1:100 SIA licensed security staff to customers will be employed during such events.
24. Staff training should reflect the Licensing Act 2003 and include the licensing objectives, proof of age, and conflict management. The training will be refreshed every 6 months and all staff training records should be maintained and kept on site. A designated member of staff

should be able to produce the records on the request of police or other authorised person.

25. A capacity for each event shall be agreed in line with the London Fire Brigade and Croydon Council. This capacity shall be agreed a minimum of 60 days in advance of the event and will take into consideration the size of the event site, the event infrastructure, the nature of the event and expected audience. The agreed capacity must be recorded in the event management plans and means of monitoring crowd number shall be in place.

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- ④ As a very local resident to the park I strongly object to there being an alcohol license granted at Wandle Park.

I currently live less than a few hundred metres from the park and the idea of having a continuing license agreement granted in wandle park will be to the absolute detriment of local residents.

Theobald Road is already a road used as an access point for dog walkers - this has the undesired effect of leaving dog mess and general untidiness on Theobald Road (and the other parallel roads).

**A rise in anti-social behavior, crime and disorder, usually associated with the sale of alcohol - will invite vandalism and urination to the local area.**

The park will no longer be child friendly, and would actually present a risk to children. I frequently take my son to this park - this will no longer be the case under a new license. The license would also conflict with amenities available to children in the area - potentially putting them at risk.

Any license to sell alcohol should be done on a per-event basis.

Dear council officers,

I would be grateful for the Licensing Committee giving consideration to all of the following regarding this application.

The committee is invited to grant a blanket seven day a week 10 am to 9.30 pm licence to the authority that would then be passed on to persons unknown to the committee acting as agent for the authority. The committee is not able to make a judgement as to whether the extensive conditions set can be met by persons unknown to the committee and it would thus be inappropriate for a licence to be granted by the committee without the knowledge of the ability of operators to deliver on the conditions.

Separately, the excessive eleven and a half hour period for the opportunity for intoxication needs to be considered in the context of the committee's responsibility for the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm and the level of crime in the park currently and the competing needs of other park users. The Leader of the council indicated at the launch of the Mela 2018 that he would like to see tens of thousands attending events at Wandle Park. Having tens of thousands of people having the opportunity for inebriation for 11 hours and thirty minutes might compromise the enjoyment of park users through the public nuisance created by an extended period of drinking. I appreciate that conditions are set to limit excessive inebriation but very large events create significant challenges for such controls and as it is this application does not give the reassurance that any agents acting on behalf of the authority have the capability to enforce the conditions of operation because the application does not detail who those agents are. The park has a very well used play area for children

and the committee should give consideration to the impact of drunk adults on the children playing close to the site of events staged in the park.

I trust that the committee will give serious consideration of the impacts of extended drinking hours on the prevention of crime and disorder in a park that suffers from heavy drinking by young people, drug dealing, muggings, threatening behaviour and grooming by paedophiles, all as detailed by the Broad Green SNT at a meet up at the park on Tuesday of this week.

In these circumstances, and in the context of the committee's responsibilities for the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm, consideration might be given as to whether a mitigation might be made to have drinking only from noon till 9.30 pm, although I do appreciate that it is also the role of the committee to consider whether the opportunity for inebriation for only nine and a half hours would compromise the viability of events in the park.

It should be noted that many events do not start later than 10 am in the park such that such a change in hours would not inconvenience sellers of alcohol.

I live in Vicarage Road, very close to Wandle Park tram stop and therefore to the park entrance. I am happy to accept a degree of occasional noise and disruption which goes with this for the wider interest.

However, I am concerned that the proposed start time of 10am mentioned in the licence application is disproportionately early and opens up the possibility of increased noise, disorder, disruption and unpleasantness later in the day. As I believe local councillors have suggested, would it not be more proportionate for the licence to be granted from midday, when food is also likely to be available (and to be consumed, given that it will be lunchtime)?

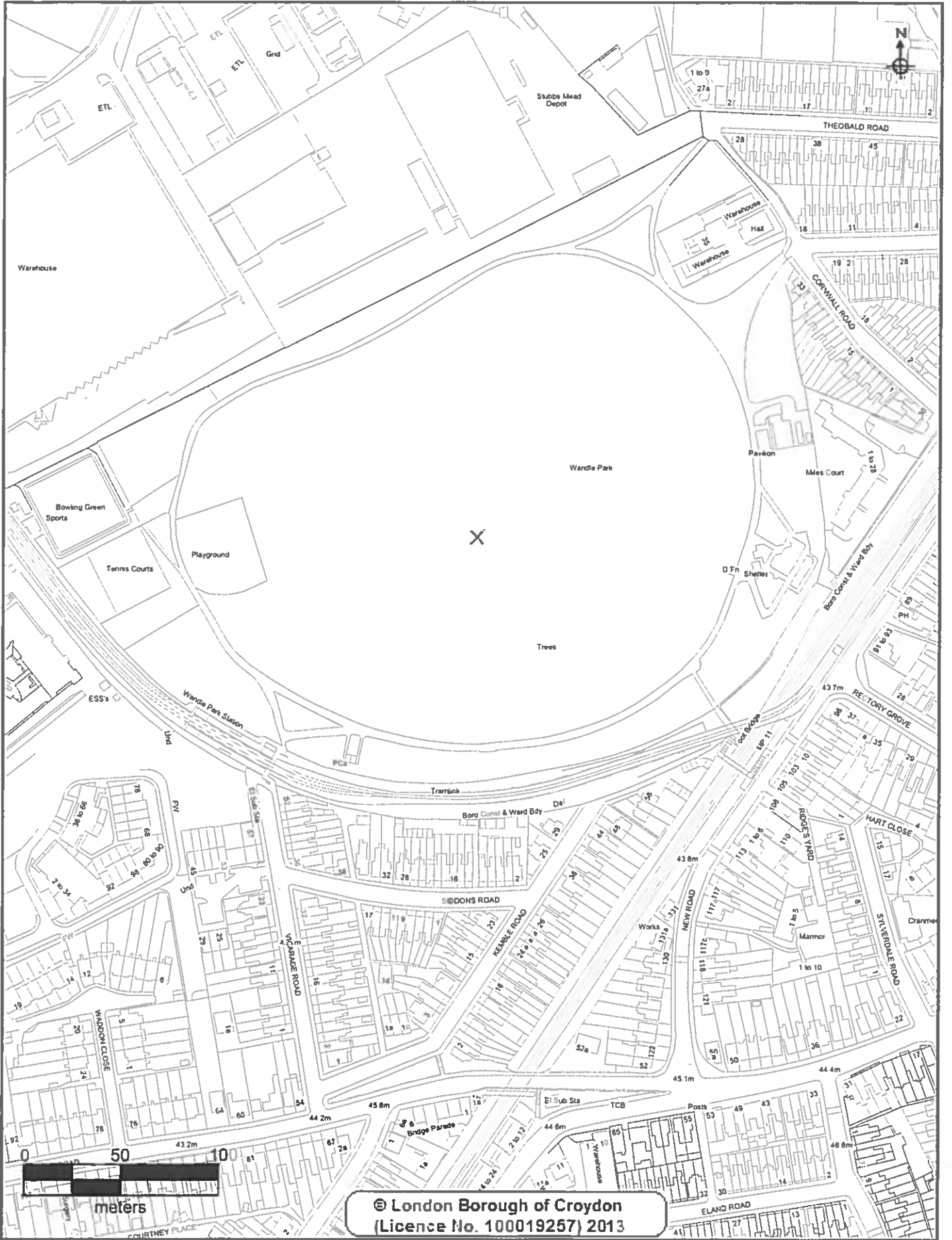
